Re-opening the Building – Barrett

We are planning to re-open our church building on Sunday, June 7. As we prayerfully prepare for the day when part of our church family will meet again at the building, I want you to be aware of five key principles that have guided our decision-making.

First, our primary goal is not to get people back into the building. Instead, it is to honor God in everything we do. In 1 Corinthians 10:31, Paul wrote, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." So, we are making decisions about our return to the building based on a desire to please God, not on a desire to return to how things were prior to the virus.

Second, our attitude is to always be mindful of the other person. As citizens of the kingdom of God, we believe we are to always consider the other person more than we consider ourselves (Philippians 2:3). Therefore, this process of reopening the church building has less to do with the consideration of my rights/preferences and more to do with my consideration of the other person.

Third, our humble confession is that we are not experts in the process of reopening a church building during a pandemic. Therefore, we have made the intentional decision to closely follow the CDC guidelines and government instructions in regard to this situation. We have allowed these agencies to do much of the heavy lifting and we have leaned on their guidance in our decision-making. Once you click on the link, simply scroll down to the item called "Places of Worship." We have worked to follow these guidelines as closely as possible.

Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves.

Philippians 2:3

Fourth, our time frame is a slow one. To use an old analogy, we are following the path of the tortoise and not the hare. We are not in a rush to get every one quickly back to the building again. We are going to take this slow and it is going to be accomplished in phases. We are not doing this out of fear or lack of faith but because we think a patient and deliberate approach is the most prudent way to reopen our church building.

Fifth, our decision to have people return to the building is an invitation and not an imposition. Please know the last thing we want is for this decision to make you feel pressured or guilty. We acknowledge this a complex issue and we trust the Holy Spirit to lead you in making the right choice for you and your family. We ask that everyone be quick to show one another a tremendous amount of love, grace, and patience as we make these choices.

In preparation for this big day, you will be emailed a document next Wednesday, May 27th, detailing the first phase of this process. Please let us know if you have any questions or concerns about the plan.

Around 67% of those who responded are ready to return to the building – if it's half full, three-quarters full or completely full. Bottom line – we miss seeing each other. Hopefully, you'll have that opportunity soon. Plans are shaping up to make that happen. Please continue to be patient and understanding as we progress slowly toward that end.

One of the most significant messages I glean from this survey is contained in the comment section. Once again trust and confidence in the leadership team was clearly expressed. So many people communicated this message. We have a healthy church family because we are led by shepherds who are authentic, compassionate and engaged. This message continues to ring true and I'm grateful to be a part of such a healthy church family. Thanks to each of you for being willing followers and thanks to our shepherds for being Spirit-led leaders.

Please correct us when we are tempted to look down on someone else for wanting to move too cautiously or too quickly. Help us to always show to others the grace which you have shown to us.
