

A Question to Consider - Kevin

I have a question for you which I will get to very quickly. It's a question I hope you spend some intentional time considering. At our staff meeting today we talked for a long time about racism. We are all heartbroken by the events in the news lately and we hurt with and for the families who have suffered loss. Don't ever lose sight of this reality. Someday there will be no racism. In God's Kingdom we will all be one in Christ.

I suppose we could list many different reasons to answer the question, "Why racism?" Not a single reason we list will hold up under the weight of Kingdom ethics and values. Here is one reason I want to mention which definitely shrivels when Kingdom values are applied. Someone with a different skin color than mine is inferior to me. Being white to some people is a reason to believe they are better than someone who wasn't born with white skin. Something in our fallen nature precipitates this decision toward superiority.

I read this line today: Racism would be the very first thing to start happening in a culture absent of God. Why is that? Because at the heart of God's gospel lies an indisputable truth. We are all broken, every one of us, and we need a Savior. If God doesn't rescue us from ourselves, we will never experience wholeness and we will create counterfeit avenues to support a false image of ourselves. If God does rescue us, it is solely because of his mercy. I have no justifiable reason to believe I'm better than anyone. We are all born in the same condition – we need a Savior. Fundamentally, nothing about us is more basic nor more urgent than that fact. I would surmise most everyone who reads this right now, you would not consider yourself a racist. So let me change the question. Who do you think you're better than?

A Shepherd's Prayer - Tony

One of the words we're hearing a lot of right now is "normal" -- as in, "When are we getting back to normal?" and "What is the new normal going to look like?" As businesses reopen and more activities resume, some people's lives might return to much like they were before the pandemic began. For many people, there will be a new normal that is significantly different from our lives prior to Covid-19. Regardless of our life situation, I doubt that any of us will ever be the same. I've learned a lot about myself the last two months -- especially areas that God has shown me I need to grow. That leads me to the questions that all of us can benefit from asking --

"What have I learned about myself? What is God trying to teach me?"

I do not want to be like the person of James 1:22-24, which reads, "Do not merely listed to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in a mirror, and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forget what he looks like."

Prayer: "Father, thank you for what you are teaching us during this pandemic. Please help us not to be like the person in James 1:22-24, but with praise and thanksgiving, grow in our relationship with you. In the name of Jesus we pray, amen!"
